### Life: A Treasure from God

You shall not murder. - Exodus 20:13

Dear Friends in Christ Jesus,

In the Fifth Commandment God extols to us the gift of life. Your life is a gift from the Lord's "fatherly divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness" (Small Catechism, Apostles' Creed, explanation of Article I) in us. God Himself "knitted you together in your mother's womb" (Psalm 139:13). The reason you exist is no accident. Your life is a precious treasure given to you from the Father in Heaven. The Lord is the author of life.

This same truth applies to all other living creatures, human and non-human. God is the creator and sustainer of life. G.K. Chesterton, a British writer who lived at the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, describes God's creative work in this way:

But perhaps God says every morning, "Do it again" to the sun; and every evening, "Do it again" to the moon. It may not be automatic necessity that makes all daisies alike; it may be that God makes every daisy separately, but has never got tired of making them. It may be that He has the eternal appetite of infancy; for we have sinned and grown old, and our Father is younger than we."

The Lord God delights in you. He delights in who you are and what you do. Likewise, the Father in heaven delights in all of His creation. Why? Because He created all things. God only makes good things. And though things have gone haywire because of sin, God's will is to continue to bring new life, both physical and spiritual, each and every day. Christ is indeed risen!

As God's creatures and as followers of Christ Jesus we are duty bound to protect and defend human life at every stage. As Luther teaches us: "We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body..." (Small Catechism, explanation to the Fifth Commandment). How can we do this?

Supporting women who are at-risk for aborting their children in the womb. A great local resource and ally in the fight for life is Guiding Star Siouxland in Sioux Center. Abortion breaks the Fifth Commandment in two ways: 1) the unjustifiable killing of a human being; 2) the mother who decide to abort her unborn child is left to suffer in body, mind, and soul with no help from organizations who preached to her the false gospel of abortion.<sup>2</sup>

On a similar note, we as the Church can and should celebrate every life. Children are a heritage from the Lord. May God guard us from grumbling or complaining when these our younger brothers and sisters in Christ are energetic and talkative during services. It's part of their

God-given vocations. Remember also the words of our Lord: "Let the little children come to me and do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 19:14).

As the Church we are to care for both young and old and everyone in between. The apostle calls us to "rejoice with those who rejoice, and to mourn with those who mourn." (Romans 12:15). No matter where a person is at in their life, no matter their joys and their struggles, as the body of Christ, that is, as the family of God, we have a responsibility to care for one another. And part of this is ensuring and encouraging that the gift of life is celebrated and maintained well for the glory of God and for service to the neighbor.

May God grant you to see your life as the precious gift He's freely given to you. Your life is then to be one of receiving life with thanksgiving, and seeking to help others with their joys and struggles in their lives as well.

Next month, we will turn our attention to the gift of Holy Matrimony, which is the foundational unit of all of society.

"Do not be deceived: God is not mocked, for whatever one sows, that will he also reap." – Galatians 6:6

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"You reap what you sow." This is a universal truth. Whatever you sow/do, you will reap the consequences for those actions. For example: the person who eats unhealthy food will reap the harvest of poor health. The person who sows discord and strife will reap more discord and strife. The person who sows repentance and faithfulness will reap the harvest of salvation in Christ.

This is also true in matters of stewardship. If you sow selfishness and stinginess, you will reap the results of a lonely and broken life. However, if you sow gratitude and generosity, then you will reap the harvest of a full and blessed life.

"Do not be deceived: God is not mocked..." This is how God has hardwired the creation to be. You need to ask yourself: what am I sowing? What am I pouring my time, my strength, and my money into? Is it fruitless entertainment? Or are you sowing the seeds of faith like: reading your Bible, repenting of your sins, living a life of prayer, attending to God's Word and the blessed Sacrament in the Divine Service? You will reap what you sow. And not just for yourselves, but for your children and your children's children.

At the end of the day remember this: "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich." In Christ Jesus (who is present for you in Word and Communion), you have riches beyond compare. When Jesus gives you Himself, you have a treasure more valuable than all the world's wealth.

So, then, be intentional every day in what you do. Sow the seeds that grow up into faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. For these are in accord with the Holy Spirit.

### Youth Update

### Mark 16:1-8

When we met on Sunday March 17, we discussed Holy week and then Easter. After the devotion the youth filled over 1,000 eggs for the Easter Egg Hunt. The youth had an egg that they opened during the devotion which was empty to represent the empty tomb then they all received a king size Hershey bar. Below is the devotion for that evening.

Tonight, we are going to skip ahead a couple of weeks to Easter. Before we get to Easter, we need to go back a few days. We have Maundy Thursday where Jesus washed His disciples' feet and instituting the Lord's Supper. Where Jesus let His disciples know that this is His body and blood given and shed for the forgiveness of sins. We then get to Good Friday when Jesus died on the cross. What is good about this day? Three men died this day by crucifixion. Do you go up to people that may have lost someone saying this a good day that your loved one has died? I would assume the answer is no. We would come across as heartless, we would come across as lacking compassion.

I want you to open the eggs that you have. What is in your eggs? Did everyone get something? The eggs are empty? How did that make you feel? It probably made you sad. I wanted to set the stage for how Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome who was going to the tomb. Mark tells us they were discussing who was going to move the stone from the entrance of the tomb. When they arrived what happened? The angel appeared letting them know He is not here, He has risen! The angel gave strict instructions to tell Peter and the other disciples that Jesus is going before you to Galilee. We hear the ladies left in fear and awe. This is not unusual this is common when individuals come in the presence of angels. Christ overcame death, sin, and devil. The tomb could not contain Him.

We know we need a Savior. We know we need a savior just by stepping out of the doors of this church. We see a world that is selfish. We see a world that is more about their agenda instead of Christ's agenda. We see a world if you are not like me, I will bully you. We see a world that states they are too busy for their Lord. Because of Jesus death as we see our sins on the cross. Our loving Lord Christ Jesus put our sins on Him to have us redeemed. Where at first seeing the empty tomb on that first Easter morning seems sad, because the ladies find out that Jesus is not there. There is joy in knowing the love of Christ for laying down His life for us. We know Jesus has redeemed us. We are reminded of this every time we come to the alter and hear the beautiful words, take eat, this is the true body of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ given into death for your sins. Take drink this is the true blood of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ shed for the forgiveness of your sins. If you believe those words given and shed for you, then you receive what they say, forgiveness of sin, salvation, and life everlasting. This Easter remember we received the greatest gift, which is life, not just life in this world but in eternity. This is why Good Friday is good. This is why Easter is joyous. This Easter may the Holy Spirit call you to spread the joyous message of Salvation with others. May the Holy Spirit call you to remind others that they cannot save themselves but only Jesus the risen Christ who can save us. Amen.

- Lent is a wonderful time to be transformed by the renewal of our minds by the Lord through His holy Word. I thank God for the strong turnout we had on Ash Wednesday, as well as the steady number who have been attending the other midweek services. The potluck meal has been a blessing to fellowship with one another.
- Men's fellowship met for its first time in February. The comradery and study of God's Word was
  encouraging and edifying. All men who are confirmed and older are welcome to attend the next
  fellowship gathering on Thursday March 21<sup>st</sup>.
- Catechism is going well overall. One of the questions that I think we as a congregation need to consider
  is: how can we be transformed daily in our walks with this world? It is frightening to see in myself how
  much complicit conformity I have with the ways of the world. And I'm sure that if everyone did some
  serious Scripture reading and reflection, most would see the same reality. May God guide all of us to
  confess this and be conformed rather to Christ, our Lord.

Unfinished Business: Constitutional Review.

### **New Business:**

- Mike asked if the Board of Lay Ministers have discussed weekly communion since the month of February, we averaged over 40 people going up to the Alter. It was discussed. In the early church days communion was weekly per Luther Small Catechism. The question was posed when did communion go away from weekly? Pastor advised in the pioneer days when churches did not have anyone to distribute communion.
- Mike brought up about the acolytes and cross bearer getting too hot during the worship service and to see if we can decrease the sanctuary thermostat. The Council was unsure who controls the thermostat.
- Insurance was renewed with Grinnell Mutual with a big change. The deductible was increased from \$10,000 to \$41,000 for wind and hail damage.
- The Council voted to keep the 4 candles (the 2 on the altar and the 2 on the wooden stands beside the altar). It was also voted to get 'liquid' candles in place of the two 'wax' candles on the altar.

Adjournment & Closing Prayer: Closed with the Lord's Prayer.

### Faith Lutheran Church Voter's Meeting – March 10, 2024

Meeting Opened: Neil Bracker, Chairman, opened the meeting at 9:45am, following the Worship Service.

<u>Devotion & Prayer</u>: Neil led the assembly in devotion with a reading from Hebrews 10:24-25 (A Call to Persevere), and an opening prayer.

Roll Call of Voting Members: Clipboards were passed around for attendance. Neil asked if there was anyone wanting to become a voting member. Motion Made, Seconded, and Carried (MSC) to accept Jordon Pace as a new voting member. He stated that if your name isn't on the attendance sheet, sign at the bottom. (Connor Huss and Patti Van Skike, who signed the attendance list, were re-instated as voting members.)

<u>Minutes</u>: Paula Koller read the minutes of the previous meeting on November 12, 2023. The motion was MSC to approve the minutes as read. Neil thanked ALL who do volunteer work at church – he didn't mention specific individuals or groups because didn't want to leave anyone out.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Neil mentioned that January was not a good month; but February was better. Our offerings at the end of February are \$13,000 behind our 2024 budget amount.

Reports of Administrative Boards: None. (The 2023 Annual Report was emailed to the members and copies were available at this meeting.)

Reports from Committees: None.

State of the Parish Report: Pastor focused his message on Philippians 3:7-8 "But whatever gain I had, I counted as loss for the sake of Christ. Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord". Pastor said our time need not be spent worrying about the present or future; but daily being committed to knowing Christ and sharing Him with others. He mentioned that it isn't too late to start joining others who are reading the whole Bible through this year; or partaking in Sunday School or Adult Bible classes; or joining the Faith Women's Group; or the Men's Fellowship group. He shared that Lent is a season of repentance, and it's important knowing Christ and making Him known, rejoicing that His Son died for our sins and rose again. He closed by asking for 'questions or thoughts' from those in attendance.

<u>Unfinished Business - Constitution Review.</u> Howard Vlieger said he was over optimistic in saying we'd have the constitution ready for this Voter's Assembly. He said when the committee completes its review, the constitution needs to be sent to the District for them to review. The person he spoke with at District said it's a rarity having congregations do this but was appreciative that this is being done. She said there is a Pastor at District who will review our changes. The plan now is to have the review completed by the next Voters Assembly in November.

New Business: Neil said the Church Council has been discussing our insurance needs. He said few companies want to write insurance for churches due to the rising prices, so we don't have much choice in choosing a new company. We are currently insured through Grinnell Insurance; and the wind and hail deductible (excluding fire) is going up from \$10,000 to \$41,000 (it's based on a 1% value of the structure which they valued at 4.1 million). We don't have input on the church's value since we don't pay real estate taxes, showing an assessment value. They met with Brenda Richardson from Perspective Insurance, and did some checking elsewhere, but decided for now to stay with Grinnell.

Adjournment: Neil asked for any other business. There being none, the motion was MSC to adjourn (10:05am).






